There's jubilation in Tennessee, the final battleground for women who've been seeking the vote.

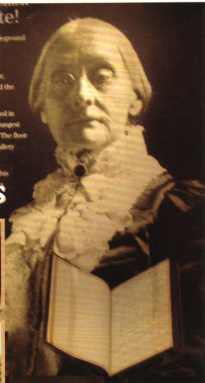
After Congress passed the 19th Amendment, the states still had to approve it. This summer, all eyes turned to Tennessee. Could the state's legislators would the amendment make it?
