
a crisp, clear and cold day yet the sun was shining! Excited 6-8 graders started arriving at the Schine Student Center on the campus of Syracuse University to take part in an annual event that focuses on what else: History!

OHA is the local coordinator for this incredible student event. Starting as a small contest in Cleveland, Ohio in 1974 to make teaching and learning history a fun and exciting experience, the event is now under the auspices of the National Archives and Records Administration in Washington and attracts almost one million students each year in 48 states. Contests begin on the regional level, with some students moving on to the state and finally the national level.

It's a fun and exciting experience because it provides both teacher and student the opportunity to use their creative abilities to produce a historical work around an annual theme. This year's was "Taking a Stand in History: People, Ideas, Events". Since History Day is based on inquiry and the experiential method of teaching social studies, students can examine a smaller event, person, or idea and relate it to the national story. Through primary and secondary research, they come to their own conclusion about historical significance and gain a greater understanding of why learning history is valuable.

Central New York National

History Day participants tripled this year from a 2005 figure of just under 50 students to a remarkable 127 and from two school districts participating to six. Over 25 judges from the professional, educational and services community volunteered to review submissions in all five categories. Did winners from the regional

So, OHA is alive and well and beckoning to you.



CROSSROADS IN TIME: COMING SOON!


OHA Holds Rare Daguerreotype

This image of Frederick Douglass was made when he was about 26 years old, circa 1841-1845. It was probably taken before Douglass' anti-slavery trip to England. The original, in the OHAM&RC collection, is a full-plate daguerreotype.

FREDERICK DOUGLASS IN SYRACUSE

In April OHAM & RC inaugurated a new feature of our website (cny.history.org) called "Object of the Month". Diverse items such as art objects, artifacts and documents from OHA's extensive collections will all be featured. The following article is an adaptation of the first installment of "Object of the Month".

Frederick Douglass appeared in Syracuse on several occasions. Not only did he come to Syracuse to deliver various lectures, but he also came here to recruit volunteers for a new Union Army regiment comprised of African Americans forming in Boston. Frederick Douglass, who came to Syracuse March 11, 1863 to recruit for the 54th Massachusetts Regiment, was quoted as saying "The arm of the slaves is the best defense against the arm of the slave holder." The 54th Massachusetts Regiment's story was told in the 1989 movie "Glory."
